**3:00 - 4:30 p.m. Program presented by Dr. James Johnson**, joining us from his apartment in New York City. His topic is, "What to Teach in Place of ...." He will review Baroque, Classical and Romantic pieces that we all tend to use for recitals and auditions and suggest new literature that we should explore and consider teaching in place of the "old war horses."



James Johnson maintains an active career as a concert pianist, organist-choirmaster, and educator.

He has performed and/or recorded with the Boston Pops, the Royal Philharmonic, the Leningrad (now St. Petersburg) Philharmonic, the National Symphony, and the National Radio Orchestra of Slovenia. His recordings have appeared on the "Best Recent Recordings" lists of Clavier Magazine.

His lineage as a pianist can be traced back to Rachmaninoff, Liszt, and Beethoven through links with his teachers, Ozan and Patricia Benkman Marsh, who studied with Rachmaninoff himself, as well as with Emil von Sauer.

From the early days of his career, critics have frequently and favorably compared his playing to keyboard giants such as Horowitz. Johnson is a Steinway artist.

His biography appears in Who's Who in America, and is in Living Legends, a publication of the International Biographical Centre, Cambridge, UK.

The Music Teachers National Association held their national convention last month. Members attending were asked what their biggest challenge has been during the past year from the following list. I have listed them in the order of most concerned about to the least. There were approximately 1,100 people who ranked these from 1 to 10.

- 1. Solving the technology issues of teaching online 47.26%
- 2. Zoom fatique 43.20%
- 3. Feeling disconnected from others 39.86 %
- 4. Uncertainty about everything 28.64%
- 5. Keeping students motivated to continue lessons 26.73%
- 6. Worry over the future of performances 25.78%
- 7. Keeping myself motivated 24.34%
- 8. Health concerns 20.29%
- 9. Other (please specify) 18.38%
- 10. Maintaining household income 11.93%

It is interesting that the MAPTA Board chose this month's topic from Dr. Johnson's list. At the MTNA national conference last month, there were many seminars focused on encouraging teachers to use new repertoire by reviewing the works of many women composers and composers from many countries. "Diversify Your Teaching Repertoire," "Music of Brazil," "Nordic Composers and Selected Works," and the piano music of Duke Ellington, Florence Price and Margaret Bonds were all presented.
